Constitution of the Junior Fair Board

Article I

Membership: Any boy or girl who resides in Morrow County, attends school in Morrow County, **and** who is enrolled in a youth organization that is based in Morrow County, (4-H, FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts), or has met the approval of membership through the youth organization that is consistent with their state rules for (i.e. Cross County line membership in 4-H) and is 15 years of age as of January 1 of the current year or a freshman in high school, and has not reached their 19th birthday as of January 1st of the current year, will be eligible to become a member of the Junior Fair Board. **EXCEPTION: FFA members who are still in High School AND in FFA may show if they are 19 or under, despite not being 4-H age.**

1. Junior Fair Board members must abide by all rules governing Junior Fair.
2. Any member found smoking, drinking, chewing, or anything else illegal for minors will be removed permanently & immediately from the board. If you are in a place where people look up to you (role model) you are not to do any of the above **even if you are of legal age.**

Article II

The Junior Fair Board will consist of at least 25 members with representatives as follows:

- 5 representatives from FFA
- 10 representatives from 4-H Clubs
- 1 Boy Scout representative
- 1 Girl Scout representative

In each case, the chairman of each county group will be responsible for reporting membership selection to the Junior Fair Coordinator by November 15th.

Article III

All members will be selected for a term of 1 year. Each member may return with Junior Fair Board Advisor approval after a year-end evaluation, and Junior Fair eligibility not being exceeded. Those with a negative evaluation may be asked not to return the next year.

Article IV

The organizational meeting will be held in January of each year. Members interested in serving as an officer ***must*** turn in an application by December 20th. Elections will be held in January of each year. There will be NO nominations from the floor UNLESS no one applies for the position.

Article V

Junior Fair Advisory Committee: This committee will serve in an advisory capacity to the Junior Fair Board. THE PURPOSE OF THIS COMMITTEE is:

1. To be a liaison between the board and the organization they represent.
2. To provide advice and guidance to the board.
3. To assist in establishing and enforcing rules pertaining to Junior Fair.

Members of the Advisory committee will serve 1-year terms and will be selected by their respective organizations. Committee members should report to the Junior Fair Coordinator no later than November 15th.

Membership will consist of a **MINIMUM** of the following:

- 1 Junior Fair Coordinator
- 1 Vocational Representative
- 7 4-H Volunteers
- 1 Member of the County Extension Office Staff
- 1 Advisor from each: Boy Scouts & Girl Scouts
- 4 Directors of the Morrow County Agricultural Society

Article VI

ANY member OR advisor who cannot attend a meeting MUST CALL THE JUNIOR FAIR COORDINATOR BEFORE the meeting.

An excused absence is:

- Death in their family
- Family/personal illness
- School activity in which you participate, county, state, or national award trips
- Or the discretion of the Coordinator

Two unexcused absences can lead to dismissal from the board.

If a member needs to be replaced, each organization will be responsible for their member. Any member who finds they will not be able to be at the fair must give WRITTEN notice to the board by the June meeting. An additional member will be added to the board to help with summer activities and be an active member on the board. The new member will be eligible based on % of time on the board.

Article VII

A Junior Fair Board Member MUST exhibit in the Junior Fair the current year of term.

Article VIII

If a Junior Fair Board Member wishes to resign, a letter of resignation must be addressed to:

Article IX

Proposed changes to the Constitution and rules governing the Junior Fair must be submitted in writing to the Junior Fair Coordinator no later than October 30th.

Article X

The Executive Committee will be made up of:

President	Secretary/Treasurer in Training
Vice-President	Historian
Secretary	County Extension Educator
Treasurer	Junior Fair Coordinator
Parliamentary Officer	

A MINIMUM of 5, present to do business as an Executive Committee.

Regular meetings require 51% of the whole board in attendance to vote on issues.

Article XI

Any Jr. Fair Board member or royalty (male or female) may not be or have been married, be an expectant parent or be a parent.

Article XII

Code of Conduct will be followed along with all rules in Junior and Senior Fair Books.

Article XIII

Award and T-Shirt committees of 5 will be standing committees.

REVISIONS TO THE 2021 MORROW COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR HANDBOOK

1. Overweight rabbits (over 5.5lbs) and poultry (Broilers over 8lbs) to go through the sale ring, but not be eligible for Grand or Reserve Champion.
2. Exhibitor's can no longer wear sashes, farm names, or name tags while showing in the show ring.
3. Jr. Fair Junior Advisors - There will be a max of eight Jr Fair Junior Advisors and must have been a member of the junior fair board, the year prior.
4. The Beef and feeders will be combined into one department.
5. Only the 1st and 2nd place cattle will return for the final champion drive.
6. Rule changes in Beef Carcass Class:
 - *Animal must be one that is shown in the Jr. Fair.
 - *Entry must be made on exhibitors' fair entry, no exceptions.
 - *A poster will be hung in the barn to confirm entry.
7. Revision to Article XI in the Jr Fair Constitution: An individual will no longer be eligible as a member of the Jr Fair Board or Fair Royalty, if they are an expectant parent.
 - Previously – Any Jr. Fair Board member or royalty (male or female) may not be or have been married or be a parent.
 - Now – Any Jr. Fair Board member or royalty (male or female) may not be or have been married, be an expectant parent or be a parent.
8. Horse Pre-Entry will now be mandatory for the horse show

RULES GOVERNING THE JUNIOR FAIR

Eligibility

Eligibility for Morrow County Jr. Fair participation is possible when the following requirements are met:

1. A child is enrolled in 3rd grade **AND** is at least age 8 as of January 1 of current year. **EXCEPTION:** Tiger Cubs, Cub Scouts, Brownie Scouts.
2. A child has not reached their 19th birthday as of January 1 of the current year (or eligibility ends December 31 of year child turns 19 years old. **EXCEPT FFA members who are still in high school may show if they are 19 or under & in FFA despite not being 4-H age.**
3. Child is a member of one of the following Morrow County youth organizations: 4-H, FFA, BSA Scouts and Girl Scouts.
4. Child is a Morrow County Resident or student enrolled in a Morrow County School District or a child has met the approval of membership through the youth organization that is consistent with their state rules (i.e. Cross county line membership for 4-H)

5. Boys and girls who reside outside of Morrow County but are members of Morrow County Youth groups must direct a letter to the Junior Fair Coordinator, P.O. 168, Mt. Gilead, Ohio 43338 giving reason for wishing to participate in the Morrow County Fair. EXCEPTION: 4-H members are to contact the Morrow County 4-H Educator.
6. Any exhibitor in the Junior Fair shall be eligible to exhibit in the Senior Fair by making proper entry as set forth in the Rules and Regulations of the Morrow County Agricultural Society.

Animal Entry Rules

1. An exhibitor is limited to 2 entries (1 Entry = 1 animal) in each class except for **breeding livestock which may show 2 per class per breed.**
2. Each exhibitor may show **only 2 market animals in any one division.**
EXCEPTIONS: **Poultry** exhibitors can take only one pair of each species and only one turkey.
Market Beef are allowed 3.
Feeder Calves are allowed 3.

Livestock Living Arrangement Rules

Livestock being kept somewhere other than at the home of the exhibitor must have a living arrangement form filled out and on file at the Junior Fair office by June 7th. Visitations to homes of exhibitors and their livestock entries may take place in June, July, and August. Said visitations would take place on a lottery basis within each species and the exhibitor will be notified of the impending visit.

Family Animal

Two family market animals may be weighed in or have ID paperwork turned in for each family.

Example: Each exhibitor may turn in up to 5 market ID papers per specie. Additionally, they can submit family ID forms and a family entry form, for 2 market animals per specie. This exhibitor then has 7 market animals to choose from. An exhibitor may not bring an animal that was entered on a sibling's ID form. Only those animals entered under their own name or the family name..

Move in Day - Monday, August 30th

- All Junior Fair *still* exhibits must be in place by 8:00 pm
- LIVESTOCK MUST be on the grounds by 7:00 pm
- Weigh ins will be completed by 7:30 pm
- Livestock coming from another county fair (Senior Fair) will be permitted to arrive late with prior approval by the Junior Fair Board Executive Committee.
- Fair passes should be picked up from advisors.

Move Out Day - Monday, September 6th

- **ALL JUNIOR FAIR BOOTHS IN THE YOUTH BUILDING MUST REMAIN IN PLACE UNTIL 4:00 PM. Dismantling early will result in \$100.00 fine.**
- Dairy Cattle are released Sunday of the Fair after 8:00 pm
- Horses and ponies are dismissed at 3 pm
- **All other animals will be released by department at the conclusion of their part of the livestock sale.** Example: All sheep may go home only after the last market lamb has sold. All hogs may go home only after the last market hog has sold. This applies to breeding if there is a breeding show.
- Clothing projects in the Style Show (and only those items) will be released following the Style Show on Sunday of the fair.
- The Junior Fair Board will not be responsible for any item (excluding Jr Fair Booth Items) not removed by the close of the fair at 6 pm, 2nd Monday of the Fair (Labor Day) including livestock. **Any item left after 30 days will be disposed of.**

General Livestock rules

1. Health Regulations for the Senior Fair will apply to the Junior Fair Livestock, found in the Sr. Fair Book.
2. Livestock exhibited in the Junior Fair must be owned by the exhibitor (parent/ guardian), cared for and fed by the exhibitor by June 1, 2021. EXCEPTION: Steers and market heifers must be owned by December 1 of 2020. Please be prepared to show proof of age and possession date if asked.
3. A given exhibit can show in only one class, except for showmanship, in a group or the horse area. For example an animal cannot be shown in a Market and Breeding Class.
4. All animals weighed/checked in by one exhibitor at the pre-fair date must be shown by the same exhibitor.
5. Any exhibit entered through one youth organization cannot be entered through another youth organization.
6. Judges will place top 5 Market Overall animals, each animal will receive an award, but will not necessarily move up in the sale order.
7. If an animal has been entered in as a breeding animal and a market animal and goes over the scales it will be declared a MARKET

animal.

8. Weight discrepancy is settled on the scales. If there is a discrepancy on the scales, the animal will be taken off the scales, scales will be swept off and zeroed out, animal will be put back on the scale and reweighed. 2nd weight will be the recorded weight.
 9. Underweight and overweight market animals will be shown and graded in special classes and not allowed to compete for Grand Champion. Overweight Feeders and Underweight animals may not sell.
 10. Underweight animals may NOT show in BBR classes.
 11. There are to be no fresh tattoos or ear notches on registered animals. Tattoos or ear notches are to be totally healed, show no redness or irritation.
 12. All market animals are to be drug free when they come on the grounds. If not, the Drug Use Notification Form must show the complete drug information and be properly filled out online. Failure to comply will be cause for disciplinary action.
 13. Entries in Poultry Broiler classes may be any commercial type meat chickens. These birds may be de-beaked, dubbed, or subjected to any practice generally accepted in commercial production of meat type poultry.
 14. Livestock owners must keep pens clean and animals fed.
 15. Water must always be kept in front of all animals, except for cattle which must be watered regularly. If there is a problem, the owner will be notified in person (if possible) and/or by posted notice. They will have 3 hours to correct the problem. If the problem is not corrected within those 3 hours, a second and final notice will be given, allowing 1 final hour to correct the problem. If the problem is still not corrected, the owner will not be allowed to sell the animal and/or will be dismissed from the fair. It will be at the discretion of the Junior Fair Board if they will be allowed to show the following year. Repeat offenders will be dealt with by the Senior Fair Board Department Head.
 16. NO BUTT FANS PERMITTED.
 17. All exhibitors must be present with their exhibit at the time of judging unless excused by the Executive Committee of the Junior Fair Board. Anyone who shows a project for another exhibitor must be an exhibitor of the Morrow County Junior Fair between the ages of 8(3rd grade) and 19. If the above rule is not followed the project will not be judged.
 18. Pens, stalls, and cages are to be cleaned by the exhibitor and checked by a Fair Board member before the exhibitor may take final leave of the grounds.
 19. NO bedding shall be laid until AFTER 1:00 pm on the Sunday before fair. DO NOT move pens without permission from a Fair Board member. RECOMMENDED BEDDING; sawdust, SMALL chips, or straw. Bark is a hazard to those spreading the manure. If you use large/shredded bark or chips it is the exhibitors responsibility to remove it by the end of fair (midnight of the last day, unless cleared through a board member). Failure to remove bedding (clean pens) will result in forfeiting premiums
 20. ALL LIVESTOCK ENTERED IN THE JUNIOR FAIR COMPETITION MUST BE HOUSED IN THE SPACE DESIGNATED BY THE MORROW COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR BOARD. Breaking of this rule may be cause for dismissal from the fair.
 21. Dead Animal Policy: Animal will be removed immediately from the barn. Family will be contacted and will remove it from the grounds as soon as possible.
 22. All Grand Champion Market Beef, Swine, Sheep and Goats must immediately be sent to slaughter following sale.
 23. If illness occurs in a barn and animals are quarantined, it will be the owner's responsibility to feed, water, and bed animals till released. Then, pens cleaned on release.
 24. Drenching of an animal is prohibited unless diagnosed AND prescribed by a licensed veterinarian, AND a Veterinarian MUST be present when the drenching takes place. All veterinary prescriptions for drenching also need approval of and kept on file at the Jr Fair Office. Animals needing to be bottle fed must also be approved by Jr. Fair Board. (This rule excludes rabbit waterers and nipple waterers for hogs.) - *Drenching of an animal is defined as the act of using an instrument placed in an animal's mouth to orally administer a liquid. Examples of instruments are, but not limited to, drench guns, syringes, bottles, bottles with nipples, straws, hose, pipe, hand, etc.*
 25. Animals MUST be castrated and HEALED by 1st Monday of the fair. If NOT, animals will not be able to Show or Sell.
 26. 2:3 Rule is used to help set classes for show. If this rule applies you must have 2 exhibitors and 3 animals to make a class. Each exhibitor is allowed only 2 entries (animals) per class EXCEPT Feeders/Market Beef which may enter 3. ALWAYS list your breed, we will place you in AOB if need be after entries are made. Any underweight animal, in any specie, are NOT allowed to show in BBR Classes.

27. Pre-addressed Thank You notes will be attached to awards. Award winners are responsible for mailing them to the donor.
 28. Exhibitors are only permitted to sell 1 market animal.

29. Articles exhibited must have been made, grown, or produced since the last fair.

30. **Each exhibitor must turn in a stamped, addressed, Thank You note for the buyer/buyers to the Jr. Fair Office in order to receive their SELL CHECK. It is recommended that these be turned in to Junior Fair office by the last day of September. ALL CHECKS MUST BE CASHED WITHIN 90 DAYS OF BEING WRITTEN. (SEE Livestock Sale Rules)**

Practices not reflecting real world agriculture practices and techniques are discouraged. Livestock should be raised and cared for with the spirit and purpose of the project in mind.

Jr. Fair Passes and Premiums

1. All Junior Fair Exhibitors will pay \$5.00 for a weekly fair pass. The passes will be distributed at the Sr. Fair Board Office.
2. Advisors will also be able to purchase their pass for \$5.00. One Advisor pass for each 5 members of the club/organization will be given. For example, if your club has 15 members and 4 advisors, only three advisor passes will be allowed for that club.
3. All entries, including livestock will be graded A, B, or C with premiums paid as indicated in the fair book.
4. Junior Fair premiums will be paid out in cash, during set hours at the fair outside of the Sr. Fair Office. If premiums are not picked up by the end of fair, they will be forfeited and turned back to Sr. Fair Board. Premiums for livestock projects will be determined by the Skill-a-thon score. For Livestock projects: A - \$5.00, B - \$4.00, C - \$3.00. Still Projects: A - \$4.00, B - \$3.00, C - \$2.00.
5. When the exhibit is not deemed worthy by the judge, no premium or ribbons will be awarded.
6. Any project that is judged before the fair (this includes pre-fair agricultural judging, home economics projects, Scouts etc.) must be exhibited at the Morrow County Fair to receive a premium.

Entry Deadlines and Rules

1. Deadline for entries will be on June 7, 2021. Entries may be turned in ANYTIME BEFORE the 7th of June. All copies of each entry must be signed and dated by the club advisor.
2. **CODE of CONDUCT will be enforced.** All exhibitors will sign one on their entry form.

BBR - Bred, Born and Raised

1. Sheep, Swine and Goat BBR market classes will be limited to two entries per exhibitor.
2. Beef will remain the same as previous years.
3. BBR Papers need to be turned in by June 7, 2021
4. The decision as to which animal will be placed in the BBR class will need to be made at the fair weigh in.

MANDATORY LIVESTOCK SKILL-A-THONS, QUALITY ASSURANCE, AND DRUG USE

Ohio Junior Fair Exhibitors who have projects in the following categories MUST complete a Drug Use Notification Form (DUNF) and a QUALITY ASSURANCE PROGRAM (QA) before exhibiting their animals at the County Fair. This includes; Market steers/heifers, feeder calves, hogs, lambs, goats, lactating goats, poultry, market/breeding rabbits, lactating and non-lactating dairy cows, horses, llamas, dogs. All other animal projects (excluding llamas, dogs, cats, and small animals) must also attend a Quality Assurance session BUT do not need to fill out a DUNF. It must be understood that if the QA program and the DUNF are not completed you will NOT be allowed to enter or exhibit at the fair.

Morrow County requires that a parent/guardian of a first and second year livestock exhibitor attend a QA program, REGARDLESS OF AGE.

All MARKET ANIMALS ARE TO BE DRUG FREE WHEN THEY COME ON THE GROUNDS. If not, The Drug Use Notification Form must show the complete information and be properly **filled out online by Sunday, August 29th at noon.** Parents MUST sign this form no matter the age of the exhibitor. FAILURE TO COMPLY WILL BE CAUSE FOR DISCIPLINARY ACTION.

1. All Junior Fair Exhibitors taking animals are required to participate in a Skill-a-thon for each project they take to the fair. This includes BREEDING & MARKET of hogs, sheep, beef, dairy, poultry, feeders, rabbits, goats, horses, llamas, and dogs.
2. Any Junior Fair exhibitor who does **NOT participate in Skill-a-thon WILL NOT show, sell, or receive their premium for that project.**
3. Age groups will be divided according to showmanship guidelines. Age as of January 1, 2021 - Senior (16-19), Intermediate (13-15), Junior (11-12), Beginner (8-10) Age 8 AND in the THIRD grade.
5. Each species will have at least 4 different skill-a-thon stations. Contact the Extension Office (419-947-1070) for general information on the kind of stations possible.
6. ALL exhibitors are required to bring their books/record books. Points will be deducted for not completing or not bringing them to Skill-a-thon.
7. Awards will be given to the top 10% in each species. The top individual in each age group & species, and an overall winner in

each species will be called "Champion Project".

8. The "Champion Project" exhibitor for each species will be figured by adding the individual's total skill-a-thon score (100 points possible) and a score from their respective Showmanship classes (1st=100 points, 2nd=96 points, 3rd=92points, etc.) Ties will be broken according to Skill-a-thon station scores.

9. Skill-a-thon will take place August 9th & 10th at the Youth Building on the fairgrounds. Times will be published in the Scarlet & Gray newsletter, extension web site, and letters will be sent to head advisors. If exhibitors cannot participate at Skill-a-thon during scheduled times they should contact the Extension Office **PRIOR** to Skill-a-thon for a makeup test. **These exhibitors ARE NOT eligible for any Skill-a-thon awards. Exhibitors may compete at the Ohio State Fair and this score will count here.**

TAMPERING & MISREPRESENTATION GUIDELINES MORROW COUNTY JUNIOR & SENIOR FAIR

Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership, custody, and any irregularity in showing or judging will be considered fraud and deception. This applies to all Junior and Senior Fair judging as well as the livestock judging. To maintain a high degree of confidence and integrity in the livestock shows, the Morrow County Agricultural Society reserves the right to disqualify the exhibitor and the exhibitor's assistant who fitted the animal involved.

The following is a listing of guidelines all exhibitors must follow to enter livestock at the Morrow County Fair.

- All exhibitors must have viable proof of ownership available to prove the entire length of time animals have been owned.
- Market animals and breeding animals must be owned and under exhibitor's daily care according to established rules and regulations for the fair. This also includes all small market animals.
- The official ownership date is the date shown on the bill of sale, unless the animal was bred by the exhibitor, in which calving, or birth records must be shown.
- Registered breeding livestock must show the exhibitor as the sole owner of the animal on the breed association papers or certificates.
- All Junior Fair breeding projects must be in the exhibitor's or exhibitor's immediate family name.
- Any other Junior Fair livestock animal and animal projects must be in possession by June 1st.
- No exhibitor may show an animal which has previously sold at an auction or sale as a market animal through another fair or livestock show whether or not there is an actual change of ownership. (progressive level of show excluded)
- Any method used to misrepresent the age of an animal for a class in which it is shown is deceptive and considered illegal.
- Showing an animal for another individual by claiming ownership in order to show in a specific livestock class is prohibited.
- False ownership is illegal.

During the fair, in cases of animals requiring treatment, all medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian and the livestock show officials shall be notified. Notify the Jr Fair Office so a new DUNF can be completed online.

The proper form for reporting medications administered to animals can be picked up in the fair secretary's office or Junior Fair office and must be filled out and filed with either the Junior Fair Coordinator for Junior Fair or the Fair Secretary for Senior Fair.

Direct criticism or interference with the judge, show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. If this happens the Code of Conduct will cover these problems.

Responsibilities of and assistance given to Junior Fair Exhibitors

901-19-31

(A) A junior livestock show exhibitor shall be responsible for the continuous care, grooming and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show.

(B) An exhibitor may receive assistance in the care, grooming and preparation of the livestock entered in the junior livestock show ***provided that the assistance shall be limited to explanation or minimal demonstration provided by the following:***

- (1) Family Members.
- (2) Household members.
- (3) Advisors or adult volunteers of 4-H or FFA in the exhibitor's club or county.
- (4) Vocational agriculture instructors.
- (5) County extension educators.
- (6) Department representatives.
- (7) Veterinarians.
- (8) Members of the exhibitor's 4-H club, FFA chapter or other youth organizations.

In the question of a rule violation, the following due process will be used and recorded:

- The exhibitor and/or parties involved will be questioned by the Sr. Fair Department Head and by the Junior Fair Department Head and the responsible Junior Fair Board Advisor for that department if Junior Fair is involved.
- If it is felt a violation has occurred, Fair officials will make recommendations to the designated ethics committee of the Morrow County Agricultural Society. After the committee hears the allegations and/or evidence, they will decide if the case should be brought before the full Board of Directors.
- In the decision of allegations being brought before the Board, all parties involved will be notified of a meeting date and time with all parties having the right to present their views and/or evidence.
- Upon hearing the case, the Fair board will make a ruling. All rulings will be made within 24 hours of the allegations.
- When satisfactory evidence has been obtained by the Fair board that any of the livestock rules or rules governing the other departments of the fair have been violated the exhibitor and/or the exhibitor's family may be barred from showing in future

agricultural fairs. The minimum number of years of disbarment is three (3) years before the right to a review. In case any premium shall have been awarded to animals or exhibitors shown in violation of this rule, the Fair board will require the exhibitor to refund all premiums, trophies, awards, ribbons and sale money under each violation. Unless fraud and/or deception are involved, all championship placings will stand.

- Protests awards in any of the departments of the fair must be made in writing, signed, sworn to and clearly set forth. Protest - Witness- Account forms may be obtained in the Secretary's office on the fairgrounds. The grounds of protest must be filed with the Secretary of the Morrow County Agricultural Society not later than one day after the awards are made.
- If the protest is made by anyone other than a Senior or Junior Fair board member of the Morrow County Agricultural Society, a \$25.00 protest fee must accompany the protest account which will be retained by the Morrow County Agricultural Society if the protest is not sustained.

Prohibited Grooming Practices **901-19-33**

This is a mandatory rule

The following grooming practices are prohibited in junior market livestock shows

- a. Using any substance to enhance or change the color of the livestock, including the livestock's hide or hooves.
- b. Adding any substance externally to build up, change or alter the shape or conformation of the livestock, including by way of example but not limited to rope, false hair, graphite, hemp, and powders.
- c. Pigmented grooming aides or materials; and
- d. Slick clipping or body shaving of market hogs except on the ears and tail.

SHOWMANSHIP

As an animal exhibitor, showmanship is your chance to shine as an individual. Showmanship classes give you the opportunity to exhibit the knowledge you have acquired and the showing techniques you have learned. We want to encourage all our exhibitors to participate in a showmanship class for each of the species they bring to the fair. **Showmanship is not required to receive a premium for a completed project.**

Showmanship classes begin with the Senior class and move down to the Beginner class giving the younger exhibitors the chance to watch and learn from the more experienced. **YOU MUST SHOW IN SHOWMANSHIP IN ORDER TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR CHAMPION PROJECT.**

Showmanship classes will be divided and judged according to the following age categories (except horses): (Age as of January 1, current year) **Senior** – 16 to 18; **Intermediate** – 13 to 15; **Junior** – 11 to 12; **Beginner** – 8 to 10 (Age 8 and in the third grade)

Attire for Showmanship

Exhibitors attire for showmanship classes, as well as the judging classes should show respect for yourself and the events you are entering.

Below are recommendations for the different species:

Market Goats: Dark pants, white collared shirt, sturdy shoes.

Dairy Goat: White Pants, White collared shirt, sturdy shoes.

Pygmy: White or khaki pants, white collared shirt, sturdy shoes.

Dairy Cattle: White pants, white collared shirt (may have farm logo), sturdy shoes.

Beef Cattle: Dark pants, collared shirt, sturdy shoes.

Horse: Long sleeve Western or English attire, western hat should have a minimum of a 2" brim, boots.

Swine: Dark jeans, collared shirt, sturdy shoes.

Rabbit: Long sleeve white shirt or jacket, slacks or jeans.

Poultry: Long sleeve white shirt or jacket, slacks or jeans.

Llama & Alpacas: Dark pants or jeans, collared shirt (long or short sleeved), sturdy shoes.

Except for the horse division, you should not wear a hat. Stay away from shirts with print, sandals and shorts. Also, make sure you have all the appropriate equipment for your species and know how to use it while in the class. No royalty or Jr. Fair Board identifiers should be worn while showing. Be sure to sign up for the appropriate class and good luck!

Master Showman from each species will be selected from the current year Beginner, Junior, Intermediate and Senior Class Champions and Past Senior Showmanship winners who are still exhibiting as Junior Fair exhibitors. The Master Showman contest will be held at the end of the regular species showmanship event except for horses (see horse department schedule), all goats will have theirs on

Saturday during the Market Goat Show and feeder calves will have theirs at the end of the Dairy Feeder Showmanship. There must be a minimum of two (2) participants to warrant the contest. **YOU MAY WIN MASTER SHOWMAN MORE THAN ONCE. You may win Master Showman and compete again in Master Showman *even* if you have won Showman of Showmen.**

Participants in showmanship contests must show an animal which they have entered and exhibited in the Junior Fair.

SHOWMAN OF SHOWMEN CONTEST

Sunday, of the Fair 12:30 pm. Starting in the Horse Arena

The past & present winners of any Senior Showmanship are eligible for this contest if they are still a current exhibitor. Once a member has won Showman of Showmen, they will NO LONGER be able to compete in Showman of Showmen. These same exhibitors will have the opportunity to participate in a Master Showman contest in any species in which they have already won the Senior Showmanship category until they are no longer eligible for Junior Fair. Each contestant will be showing an animal from each of these species: beef, dairy, swine, sheep, goat, horse, rabbit and poultry. **Contestants will be responsible for supplying their own equipment.** Animals will be provided. Members should not handle one of their own animals in the contest. The Tie Breaker for this competition will be an oral question given by the county 4-H or Ag Educator, or the Junior Fair Coordinator.

THE 2021 MORROW COUNTY JUNIOR FAIR

Livestock Sale Rules

Morrow County Junior Fair exhibitors who are eligible may sell their market animal Monday, September 6, 2021 at the designated time and place. **Lambs, market beef, beef feeders, dairy feeders, hogs, and goats will be sold in the Large Show Arena beginning at 10 a.m. Geese, turkeys, ducks, chickens, market rabbits, and pen of 3 rabbits and will be sold in the Small Arena beginning at 10 a.m.**

The Following Rules Will Apply To This Sale

1. Only market animals that have been duly entered, judged and graded in regular Junior Fair competition will be eligible for sale. All sale entries must have met the requirements of the Junior Fair.
2. The Directors of the Sale Committee shall make the final decision regarding the salability of any sale entry, including but not limited to health and body condition.
3. Any animal not passing meat inspection is the responsibility of the seller.
4. Responsibility included but is not limited to all costs associated with the project.
5. No non-livestock items may be sold through the Livestock Sale except for the benefit of the Morrow County Junior Fair Building Fund. Non Livestock items must be approved by the Directors prior to the sale.
6. **Sale cards must be turned in within 15 minutes after each show.** Exhibitors turning in a late sale card before 9am Sunday will be charged a \$50 penalty. Late sale cards turned in after 9am Sunday or **exhibitors not presenting their project to sell in the assigned order** will sell their project at the end of the species with a \$100 penalty.
7. **Exhibitors turning in multiple sale cards will sell the project on the last sale card turned in.**
8. All animals will be weighed at times posted at the Junior Fair Office during the fair. No re-weighs. Disputes **must** be settled while the animal is on the scale.
9. Shrinkage will not be applied.
10. The following commission will be charged for animal sold:

* Grand Champion	3% of sale value
* Reserve Grand Champion	2% of sale value
* Others	1% of sale value
11. Each exhibitor is responsible for his or her animal up to the earlier of: the animal being picked up by the buyer, 6p.m sale day or when barn/sale area is restricted for load out.
12. No animal will be resold.
13. All animals will be sold by the head or project.
14. Grand and Reserve Champion Market Beef, Lambs, Goats, and Hogs must be slaughtered at the processing facility designated by the Senior Fair Board. Buyers of the animals are responsible for both the base and premium bids.
15. **Market Steers, Market Hogs, Market Goats, and Market Lambs sold through the sale are terminal and must go to the base bidder or processor of choice.**
16. **Rabbits and Poultry sold through the sale are to go directly onto the truck of the base bidder. They are not to go home with the exhibitor.**
17. No sale animals may be removed from a processor's truck/trailer.
18. The sale of an underweight animal as an extra to a base bidder will be at the Junior Fair Sale Committees discretion.
19. All sale checks will be voided after 90 days of issue. Checks may be re-issued with a \$56.00 reissue fee.
20. The Junior Fair Sale Committee reserves the right to restrict and/or limit any person's access to the barns and/or loading area, in, near and/or around equipment and/or other areas used in conjunction with the livestock sale on sale day. Any person(s) found to be in violation of this rule may be subject but not limited to warning, removal and/or debarment from the fair and/or loss of other privileges associated with the Morrow County Fair. Violators may face legal action. Violators will be subject to the majority vote of the Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee directors.
21. All questions or disputes regarding the sale of livestock, including but not limited to the interpretation or application of these rules, shall be determined by the majority vote of the Directors of the Sale Committee. The determination of the Sale Committee shall be subject to final review and approval by the majority vote of the Senior Fair Board and the decision of the Senior Fair Board shall be final and binding.

The \$250.00 Scholarship Award honors youth achievements and assists with their education and training beyond the High School level.

1. Basis of Award
 - a. Activity and leadership in local youth organizations
 - b. Sportsmanship and conduct at the Fair
 - c. Citizenship
 - d. Students must be entered or entering an accredited, post-high school academic program.
 - e. Individuals may only receive the scholarship once.
2. Scholarships will be paid at the presentation ceremony. Monies are given to help with college expenses.

LEADERSHIP AWARD

Presented Tuesday evening, 6:30 pm, before the Queen/King Contest in Youth Building. CITIZENSHIP AWARD

SPONSOR: THE MORROW COUNTY DEMOCRATIC EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Presented Tuesday evening, 6:30 pm, before the Queen/King Contest in Youth Building. Citizenship Awards are presented each year to two Outstanding Morrow County Junior Fair Exhibitors (preferably one boy and one girl). These awards are presented in recognition of the citizenship these youth have shown.

JUNIOR FAIR BOOTHS

Clubs wishing to have a booth must be signed up by the end of the last day of Skill-a-thon in August. A club may request a 4', 8', 12' or 16'. Due to stability and safety, if a booth larger than 16' is needed please contact the fair office. All decorations and projects must be housed *inside* the area provided. **NO HAY, STRAW, or CORN STALKS ALLOWED.** Use the current fair theme. This is a great way to showcase what your club has done and display all still projects that your members take. All decorating and projects must be in place by 8:00 pm on the 1st Monday of the fair. On Tuesday of the fair 2 awards will be announced prior to the king and queen contest. This will be awarded by independent judges who will pick 2 overall winners. Size of the booth does not matter. Beginning Wednesday through Sunday we will have the People's Choice Awards. The general public will be able to vote from 9:00 am until 6:00 pm daily. Top vote will be that day's winner. You may only win once during the current fair week. Have fun and enjoy!

JUNIOR FAIR KING AND QUEEN

Participants must be 16 years old and not over 19 as of January 1, 2021 and be a current Junior Fair exhibitor. Participants must first submit an application **and** an advisor recommendation to the Junior Fair Coordinator. Applications and recommendations are available through the Junior Fair Office, County Extension Office and on the County Extension Office website. **Deadline date will be June 7th. Applications are to be brought or mailed to the Junior Fair Office, P.O Box 168, Mt. Gilead, Ohio 43338.** All applicants must go through a judge's interview. The interviews will take place on June 27th **at the Junior Fair Office.** A specific time will be scheduled once applications are received. The Judges interview is worth 50% of your total score. The interview judges are responsible for selecting and placing five candidates each for King and Queen. The placing is worth the following percentages: 1st -

50%· 2nd - 45%· 3rd - 40%· 4th - 35%· 5th - 30%· –all candidates will be notified by mail of the choice of the interview judges. The names and a short resume of the final five candidates for both King and Queen will be placed in the Sentinel and displayed in the Jr. Fair youth building. On the 1st Monday, all Junior Fair Exhibitors will have the opportunity to cast one vote each for King and Queen. The voting will take place during still-project, food and clothing judging in July as well as at Skillathon in August. These votes will be counted, and the percentage applied to the interview judge's score. In case of a tie, the winner will be determined by the voting of the exhibitors.

The King and Queen Presentation will take place on Tuesday, at 6:30 pm in the Youth Building.

YOUTH EVENTS/CONTESTS

RABBIT AND POULTRY COSTUME CONTEST

GENERAL RULES

1. Steers and Market Heifers must have been owned and cared for by the Exhibitor since December 1, 2020.
2. **Steers and Market Heifers will be weighed First Monday of the fair, between 5:30 pm and 7:30 pm Animals Will be weighed once. This will be the official weight throughout the Fair. Any discrepancy or questions of weight by the owner shall be decided and settled while the animal is on the scales.**
3. Steers and Market Heifers must weigh 800 pounds and up.
4. An exhibitor may show 3 market animals in this division.
5. Underweight steers and market heifers will be shown and graded in special classes and are not allowed to compete for Grand Champion or sell.
6. Registered steers must show registration papers on move-in day. The breed is declared at the December weigh-in.
7. There are to be no fresh tattoos on registered animals. Tattoos are to be totally healed, show no redness or irritation.
8. If an animal does not have registration papers it will be placed in the crossbred class.
9. Market Beef are to be claimed as BBR at the time of the December weigh-in. The certificate showing breeder, address, phone number and owner must be turned by June 7, 2021.
10. The BBR classes are divided by weight NOT by breed.
 - a. The MCCA will provide the awards for the BBR classes.
 - b. The BBR Champions will follow the Grand and Reserve Champion Market Beef in the sale lineup.
11. The Morrow County Cattlemen's Association (MCCA) will sponsor a bred and owned Heifer Class for Jr. Fair participants.
 - a. Heifer must qualify under rules and classification of a junior fair project.
 - b. Heifer must have legal registration from the breed association. Crossbreds do not qualify.
 - c. Exhibitor **must be** the breeder and owner of his/her heifer. Registration papers need to be turned in on move in day of fair. Farm names will not be accepted and must have the individual's name only. Tattoos must be legible and match papers.
 - d. MCCA reserves the right to break classes if necessary.
11. Champion and Reserve of Breeds will be considered for top 5 overall.
12. Fans are to hang from the side, one fan per animal, and not to interfere with any other project. No butt fans.
13. There are to be no gates or panels between animals in the same family or farm except to separate large steers from smaller feeders or calves with board approval.

14. Steers and beef breeding projects will be dismissed from the fair only after the last steer has sold in the livestock sale.
15. Steers and Market Heifers can be shown with grooming products that are approved for use on meat animals. **State fair rule:** any product which changes, enhances, or alters the natural color of the animal will not be permitted. Included, but not limited to; paints, dye, powders, non-clear adhesives, and foams or shoe polish. This will also apply to Morrow County.
17. Soap and water only are to be used on the steers and market heifers for sale day.
18. No bedding shall be laid until after 1:00 pm on the Sunday before fair. Pen assignments will not be hung until after 1:00 pm.
Do not move pens without permission from a fair board member. **RECOMMENDED BEDDING** for Barn and Tie Outs; Straw, sawdust, SMALL CHIPS. If you use large/shredded bark or chips it is the exhibitor's responsibility to remove it by the end of the fair, (midnight of the last day, unless cleared through a SR. Board member), bark is a hazard to those spreading the manure.
19. TENTS: one 10x10 per family. Sign up at Skillathon if a tent spot is desired.
20. We will use the State Fair breed qualifications. You can pick up a copy in the Junior Fair office if you need to see it.

3. Feeder Calves are to weigh from 350 to 799 pounds.
4. Underweight and overweight feeder calves will be shown and graded in special classes and not allowed to compete for Grand Champion and cannot sell. They also may not compete in BBR classes.
5. An Exhibitor may show up to 3 market animals in this department; any combination of the two divisions.
6. There are to be no gates or panels between animals in the same family or farm except to separate large steers from smaller feeders or calves with board approval.
7. Feeder calves are required to have shipping fever shots (respiratory vaccinations) in order to show at the fair. The first one is given at the June weigh in. The second one should be given 30 days later, but no later than August 1st. The cost is \$10.00 per calf if purchased from the Jr. Fair Board. Keep shot refrigerated until needed.
8. Feeder calves will be dismissed from the fair only after the last feeder has sold in the livestock sale.
9. The Dairy Feeder Show will be divided into light weight, medium weight, and heavy weight classes. Awards for champions in each of these classes will be sponsored by the Morrow County Dairy Association. The Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion Dairy Feeder will be chosen from these weight class champions.
10. Mixed Dairy is defined under this rule: Dairy Classes will consist of the 6 major breeds in America, Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, Milking Shorthorn or a combination of them. If the animal is a dairy breed not listed, crossed with one of the American breeds or crossed with beef breed it will show as a Mixed Feeder. This class will have a Champion and Reserve sponsored by the Dairy Board.
11. Calves must be dehorned and healed.

C30 Pack Goat – any age, any ability (1st yr. goat should be able to carry an empty pack and should be able to navigate with the exhibitor like they are on a trail. This is NOT a glorified obstacle course. 2nd yr. goat should navigate with exhibitor and be able to carry a light load in their pack. 3rd yr. goat should be able to navigate with the exhibitor and be able to carry a heavy pack.) If you have questions, please call the Jr Fair office.

C31 Harness Goat (year 1) - goats must be halter broken and led on a lead strap. Animal should respond to voice commands of stop, go, back, left, and right.

C32 Harness Goat (year 2) - goats will be harnessed and pull an empty cart. The animal should respond to voice commands of stop, go, back, left, and right.

C33 Harness Goat (year 3) - goats will be harnessed and pull a child-driven cart. The animal must respond to commands of stop, go, back, left, and right while pulling the cart through an obstacle course.

Goat BBR (Bred, Born and Raised in Morrow County) market classes will be limited to two entries per exhibitor. You may weigh in up to five animals at the June weigh in. Only two will be allowed to be weighed in at fair. BBR papers are due June 7th with breeder information filled out and are needed for each animal.

The BBR Champions will follow the Grand and Reserve Champion Goats in the Sale lineup.

General Rules

All goats, claiming to be a specific breed must have a copy of breed registration papers. If you have no registration papers they will show as utility animals. Registration papers will be due move in day of fair. Animals must be checked in before unloading in the barn!!

1. Market Goats will weigh in on 1st Monday of the fair, 4-5:30 pm in the sheep barn. If you are unable to make this time, you may bring your goat(s) during the market lamb weigh in but no later than 7:30 pm. The goats will be weighed once. This will be the official weight. Weight discrepancy is settled on the scales. If there is a discrepancy on the scales, the animal will be taken off the scales, scales will be swept off and zeroed out, animal will be put back on the scale and reweighed. 2nd weight will be the recorded weight.

All underweight market goats will be shown and graded in a special class and are not allowed to compete for champion, compete in BBR nor will they sell.

2. Dairy breeding and Market goats MUST be shorn before show day.

3. Lactating dairy goats are to be in place by 8 am on Thursday and will be released at 3 pm or following the show, whichever is later, that same day.

4. Exhibitors are always to keep water in front of their goats.

5. An Exhibitor may show only two market animals.

6. All goat exhibitors will be responsible for making the allotted pen retain their goat(s) with material they provide themselves. They

- are not to use gates and panels needed to make additional pens for exhibitors.
7. Dairy goats are to be shown with choker chains. Pygmy goats are to be shown with collars and a short lead. Prong collars will be allowed in the show arena.
 8. Registered Boer breeding goats and Angora goats can have horns. All other goats must not have horns and cannot have scurs longer than two inches.
 9. Pens must be cleaned by the exhibitor and checked by a Fair board member before the exhibitor may take final leave of the grounds.
 10. Goat projects will be dismissed from the fair only after the last market goat has sold in the Livestock sale. This includes all pygmy, dairy, angora, and market goats.
 11. Scrapie ID is required for All goats (Junior and Senior Fair) including wethers. When you are buying an animal, it should have a Scrapie tag already in it before you take it home. If you need information on how to get Scrapie tags for your animals, contact the Jr. Fair office (419-947-1567) or the Extension office (419-947-1070) Scrapie Record Cards (provided by the fair, at fair or on request) Scrapie cards are to be turned in at the fair during goat check in.
 12. There are to be no fresh tattoos on registered animals. Tattoos are to be totally healed, show no redness or irritation.
 13. Registration Papers will be checked at move in day.
 14. Be prepared to have someone at your pen at 9:30 am, Tuesday of the Fair, for State Vet check. Tattoos must be legible.
 15. Bracing or not bracing of goats is a personal preference and is up to the exhibitor.
 16. Registered animals that are microchipped must also be tattooed according to the USDA rules. Animals that are not properly tattooed will not be admitted. If you have questions, please call the Jr. Fair office.
 17. BBR and market shows are two separate shows. Champion and Reserve Champion BBR will be eligible to show in the market classes and compete for Grand and Reserve Grand market goat. Being Champion or Reserve Champion BBR will not automatically give you a spot in the final drive of the market show.
 18. **See General Livestock Rules, Tampering & Misrepresentation Guidelines found towards the front of the book.**

All horses must show in A, B, C judging in order to be eligible to show in any other class during the fair.

1. Jr. Fair Draft Animals (mules, miniature horses, draft horses, & draft ponies) must show in ABC judging on move in day of the fair. This should happen after your horse/pony is body scored. This must be completed by 7:00 pm.
2. Horses arriving late or leaving the fair early are required to have **prior** approval by the 4-H Horse committee and Junior Fair Board.
3. Ohio 4-H and Morrow County Horse and Pony 4-H Rules govern all classes.
4. If an exhibitor has a question to ask the judge, he/she must get permission from the Steward in Charge.
5. Parents and Advisors only are allowed in the practice arena with their exhibitor.
6. Trainers are to have no contact with the exhibitor or animal on the fairgrounds during the duration of the fair.
7. Helmets are always required while riding or driving an equine.
8. **Stalls must be cleaned by the exhibitor and checked by a Horse and Pony advisor or Junior Fair Board member, before taking final leave of the grounds.**
9. The Horse and Pony Department animals will be dismissed from the Fair at 3 pm on 2nd Monday.
10. Any Horse registered as a Junior Fair project may be used by a parent or sibling only during specific shows at the Morrow County Fair.
11. There should always be water kept in front of the animal.
12. All feed / grain must be stored in a LOCKED tack box if in the barn. All hay and straw must be stored in your trailer.
13. **No Smoking** within 50 feet of barn.
14. Riding allowed in arena and working arena only. (No Riding in the Barn or on either side of the barn.) All horses and ponies must remain at a walk outside of arena or work area and must be led outside of the arena and area.
15. No parking of vehicles inside of fenced off area.
16. Keep horses and ponies inside fence, away from all food wagons or stands.
17. Scheduled practice sessions in the arena will be allowed from daybreak until ½ hr. before show and from conclusion of show each day until 11:00 pm
 - English practice will be Monday evening following the King and Queen Competition.
 - Contest Practice - Even Hours
 - Pleasure Practice - Odd Hours.
18. **Horses and ponies are to be ridden by 4-H Horse and Pony project member only.** Failing to abide by this rule may result in dismissal from the fair. (Exception-rule #15)
19. **Clover bud members shall not participate** in any form (riding, sitting or handling) of a 4-H Horse & Pony member's project at any time during the Morrow County Fair.

2. All turkeys, chickens and game birds moved within or imported into Ohio for exhibition must:
 - Originate directly from a flock or hatchery which is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan for the Eradication of Disease and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - Originate directly from a flock which has had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease within twelve months preceding the opening date of exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirement of this paragraph; or
 - Have had a negative test for pullorum/fowl typhoid disease, within ninety days preceding the opening date of the exhibition and be accompanied by documentary evidence that they meet the requirements of this paragraph.
 - Waterfowl, doves and pigeons are exempt from this rule.
 - A copy of the documentary evidence is to be shown & turned in at the Barn check in at the fairgrounds on 1st Monday of Fair.
3. **ALL MARKET PROJECTS ARE TO BE BANDED AT WEIGH IN.**
4. Each domesticated bird exhibited shall be inspected by the Fair Veterinarian.
5. Breeding poultry should be under 1 year of age.
6. If a poultry project is found to be older than the allowed age, it may be judged, but is not eligible for champion or to sell.
7. Underweight Broilers will be shown and graded in a special class and will not eligible to compete for Grand Champion or to sell
8. Overweight Broilers will be shown and graded in a special class and will not eligible to compete for Grand

GENERAL RULES

1. Breeding and Market Rabbits must be checked in and/or weighed in on the 1st Monday of the Fair, from 10:00 am-7:30 pm in the Rabbit Barn. **Market rabbits will be weighed once, and this will be the official weight of the fair. Any discrepancy or question by the owner shall be decided while the animal is on the scales.**
2. The exhibitor/parent must be present during the weigh in/check in of their animals on Monday.

3. Underweight and overweight rabbits/pen of threes will be shown and graded in special classes and not allowed to compete for Grand Champion or sell.
4. An Exhibitor may enter 2 single fryers and 2 breeding; 1 pen of three and 2 breeding; 1 single fryer and 3 breeding; or 4 breeding.
 - ** The Pen of Three Market Rabbits shall consist of three rabbits, all the same breed and variety. Broken meat pens must also be of the same variety. It is not necessary that they be from the same litter. The age and weight are the same as for a single market rabbit - no more than 12 weeks of age and each rabbit are to weigh from 3.5 to 5.5pounds.
5. The 'pen of three' will be housed together in one large double cage.
6. There will be Champion and Reserve Champion single market rabbit and Champion and Reserve Champion 'pen of three' market rabbits and will sell as such.
7. Breeding Rabbits will be shown in groups according to breed; Market in groups by weight.
8. There must be at least three rabbits and two breeders to be deemed a breed champion. All classes with less will be combined into one class. This class will be called "All Other Breeds".
9. Mixed Breed breeding rabbits are not eligible for Best or Reserve Best of Show.
10. **DO NOT USE CEDAR CHIPS** as bedding.
11. Jr/Sr Fair Boards have the right to cut locks on cages in dire situations.
12. **Pens, stalls, and cages must be cleaned by the exhibitor and checked by a Fair board member before the exhibitor may take final leave of the grounds.**
13. **All rabbit projects, breeding and market will be dismissed from the fair after the last market rabbit has sold in the livestock sale. ALL RABBITS MUST BE REMOVED FROM BARN ON LAST DAY/LABOR DAY BY 6:00 pm DO NOT remove animals that DO NOT belong to you.**
14. See General Livestock Rules, Tampering & Misrepresentation Guidelines found towards the front of the book.

Rabbit Poster Contest Turn in at Jr Fair Office on 1st Monday of fair, by 8:00 pm

RULES

1. Posters will be accepted at Jr Fair office till 8 pm on the first Monday of fair. They will be kept on display during the fair. Exhibiting a Rabbit poster is an optional activity BUT is highly encouraged for the benefit of the exhibitor and the viewing public.
2. There are 3 categories; Level 1 age 8-12, Level 2 age 13-15, Level 3 age 16-19. Age as of January 1, of the current year.

GIRL SCOUT

GENERAL RULES

1. The Girl Scouts consider participation in the Morrow County Fair a privilege and an opportunity to share their accomplishments, interests, and ideals. All exhibits and displays must show high quality in effort, originality, neatness, and follow the criteria of the Girl Scout Program.
2. Every registered Girl Scout, Kindergarten through 12th Grade and every registered Girl Scout Troop in Morrow County is eligible to enter. Girls must enter the level she is participating in as of January 1, of current year.
3. Judging will begin promptly at 9 am with the judging of all troop project entries. Individual project judging will follow immediately. Individual and Troop projects must be judged & exhibited to receive premium.
4. Each exhibitor may enter up to 10 projects, excluding troop projects.
5. Each troop may enter up to 2 projects. The troop leader must make the fair entries and list all the girl's names involved in creating the project. At least three girls must be present at judging from list. Only girls present at judging and exhibit will receive premium.
6. All projects need to be registered by June deadline and brought to judging in July.
7. Judging is based on the knowledge and experience gained by the girl or troop as stated in the Girl Scout handbook. Originality, creativity, workmanship, construction, and neatness are considered during the judging interview. Girls will be judged on project knowledge, presentation, requirements, attitude, and personal appearance.
8. Troop leader is responsible for contacting the Junior Fair Office (419-947-1567) by 1st Tuesday in August to request booth spot for their troop. Booth decoration and projects must be completed by 8pm the first Monday of Fair.
9. ONLY projects can be exhibited. No to exceed 22x28x22 inches. Exception is clothing projects. Projects must be identified with project card from the Junior Fair Office that will be available at booth set up. Junior/Senior Fair Board are not responsible for theft.
10. All art material must be matted or framed and ready to hang. Wires, cords, etc., must be securely attached. Valuable craft items should be boxed or under glass.
11. SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR COOKING ENTRIES: **For all cooking projects, exhibitors must make three different items** (example-bake three kinds of cookies such as peanut butter, oatmeal raisin, and sugar). Bring a sample of one kind and the recipes for all three (ingredients and directions) to judging. Pictures and/or a poster of other two items may also be brought to judging. In the case of pie, cake, and bread the whole entry should be brought to prevent drying out before judging. For cookies, candy or cupcakes, six pieces should be submitted. Refrigeration is not available. Recipe card and/or pictures of project need to be exhibited at the fair. Tasting of food by judge is optional.
12. The Girl Scouts will abide by the rules of the Morrow County Junior Fair. Entries will not be judged which do not follow all the rules in the current year Junior Fair Book. When an exhibit is deemed not worthy by the judge, no premium or ribbons will be awarded.

-The BBR Champions will follow the Grand and Reserve Champion Market Lambs in the Sale lineup.

1. Market lamb weigh in will be at the Fair on the first Monday, from 5:30-7:30 pm at the scales located in the Sheep barn. This is the official weight of the Fair. Any discrepancy or question of the weight by the owner shall be decided while the animal is still on the scales.

2. All market lambs are to be slick sheared ($\frac{1}{4}$ " or less) at fair weigh in, unless the breed declares otherwise, Example: Hair breeds.

3. Lambs will weigh 90 pounds and up.

4. Market lambs must be under 1 year of age and show lamb teeth at Fair weigh in.

5. Underweight Market Lambs will be shown and graded in special classes and not allowed to compete for Grand Champion or sell. They also may not compete in BBR classes.

6. An exhibitor may show **only two market** animals in this division.

7. Market lambs will be shown in groups based on breeds.

8. Lambs entered in Breeding Classes may not be shown as Market Lambs.

9. In Class F05 there must be three per breed to be deemed champion. All classes with less will be combined into one class – All Other Breeds. The All Other Breeds Class may consist of less than 3 animals because breed papers have been registered with the Junior Fair office. If an animal does not have breed papers, it will be placed in the crossbred class.

10. The Breeding Show will run by breed while alternating breeds in this order: Yearling Ram, Ram Lamb, Champion Ram, Yearling Ewe, Ewe Lamb, Champion Ewe,

11. All sheep must be fit within 10 feet of the barn area.

12. Over the Pen storage will be allowed but it is not to exceed the width of the pen. Storage units in the aisle must not interfere with the day to day business in the barn.

13. Sheep projects will be dismissed from the fair after the last market lamb has sold in the livestock sale. This includes both breeding and market.

14. **All sheep (Junior and Senior Fair)** are to have Scrapie tags, including wethers. When you are buying an animal, it should have a Scrapie tag already in it before you take it home. If you need information on how to get Scrapie tags for your animals, contact, the Jr. Fair Office (947-1567). Or the Extension office (947-1070) Scrapie Record Cards (provided by the fair) are to be turned in at the fair.

15. There is to be **no carpet** in the sheep pens. Bedding should be straw and sawdust only.

16. Sheep may be tied in their pens only prior to showing on a show day (Wednesday, Thursday) or in preparation for Youth Lead on Tuesday.

17. Underweight BBR entries will NOT be able to show in BBR classes.

18. See General Livestock Rules, Tampering and Misrepresentation Guidelines found towards the front of the book.

4. Winner of Intermediate Youth Lead will be the Morrow County Sheep Prince or Princess.

5. Winner of Senior Youth Lead will be the Morrow County Sheep King or Queen.

6. A **Youth Fun Lead** for those ages 8 and under who are not Junior Fair exhibitors will also be held that evening. In this division, there will be two categories, wool and costume. The sheep needs to be one that is already entered in the fair and borrowed for this event. A sign up for this event will be available at the fair in the Sheep barn.

The Morrow County Pork Producers are sponsoring Bred, Born, and Raised in Morrow County (BBR) market and breeding classes. BBR Market Hog classes will be made up from the BBR certificates that were turned in by June 7, 2021. Swine BBR market classes will be limited to two entries per exhibitor and the decision as to which animals will be placed in the BBR class will need to be made at the fair weigh in.

-The show will run by breed and split into weights if necessary.

-The BBR hogs will all come back to show on Saturday, including the Champion and Reserve.

-The BBR champions will follow the Grand and Reserve Champions in the sale lineup.

-The **BBR & Breeding will show at the same time.**

-The Pork Producers are furnishing all awards for the BBR Gilt classes

-The BBR Champions and the Breed Champions will show for Grand and Reserve Champion Overall.

-Becks Show Pigs will furnish the Champion and Reserve Purebred BBR Market awards.

GENERAL RULES

1. Fair weigh in will be the first Monday of fair, between 2:30-7:30 pm at the scales designated for Hogs. **Market Swine will be weighed once to determine the official weight for the fair. Any discrepancy of weight shall be decided and settled while the animal is on the scales.** If there are no breed registration papers shown the hog will be placed in the crossbred class. The hog must have a legible tattoo, tag, or ear notch that matches what is on the registration form.
2. All market swine must have a measurable ½” of body hair on the entire body except for the tail and ears which may be of shorter length. Hair length will be checked on the scales at weigh in and as the animal is in the chute before entering the show arena.
3. Market Swine must weigh 220 pounds and up.
4. Underweight Market Swine will be shown and graded in special classes and not allowed to compete for Grand Champion or sell, nor can they show in BBR classes.
5. There must be three per breed to be deemed champion. All classes with less will be combined into one class called All Other Breeds. The All Other Breeds Class may consist of less than 3 animals because breed papers have been registered with the Junior Fair office. If an animal does not have breed registration papers, it will be placed in the crossbred class.
6. Gilts shown in breeding classes are not to be shown as market hogs. There is to be no cross over from Junior to Senior Fair. Breeding is breeding and market is market.
7. Hogs are to show clean and with water only applied to the animal. No powders, paint, oil or adhesives.
8. Over the pen storage will be allowed but it is not to exceed the width of the pen. Storage units in the aisle must not interfere with the day-to-day business in the barn.
9. Swine projects will be dismissed from the fair after the last market hog has sold in the livestock sale. This includes both breeding and market. **No cleaning or moving out is to be done in the hog barn during the hog portion of the livestock sale.** This is to allow us to run a smooth sale without the complications of having too many people and activities in the barn at the same time.
10. During the Saturday Hog Show, all show/tack boxes and other equipment that are in the aisles of the hog barn will need to be removed by 2 pm and will not come back until after the show is complete.
11. **Extra people are discouraged from being in the barn on show day. *1 EXTRA PERSON PER EXHIBITOR.***
12. 2:3 Rule is used to help set classes for a show, a class must have 2 exhibitors and 3 animals. For BBR classes it will be by breed. For breeding swine, it will be by breed and age
13. Hoses are NOT permitted to be used in the Hog Barn for automatic waters.
14. **Breeding Swine** will be released between 9-11 pm on Sunday of the fair. If breeding swine does not go home at this time, they must wait until the rest of the barn is released on Sale Day.
15. The Market Hog show is a partial terminal show

JUNIOR FAIR SWINE CARCASS CONTEST

1. Animal must be one shown in the Junior Fair
2. One animal per exhibitor
3. Barrows and gilts are eligible
7. Cryptorchidism and late castrates will be disqualified.
8. Pigs are to be farrowed after February 1, of current year.
5. Exhibitors of each carcass will be provided the following information:

a. 10 th rib fat thickness	e. Must weigh 220 pounds or more
b. Square inches of loin area	f. Must have a 5.0 square inch loin eye
c. Hot carcass weight	g. Must have 1.0 inch or less of fat at the 10 th rib
d. % lean	
8. Entry must be made on your fair entry, no exceptions
9. A sign-up poster will be posted in the swine barn to confirm your entry
10. All carcasses will be slaughtered at Hoffman’s Meat Processing. Carcasses can be viewed on Thursday, following the fair, at 7:30 pm.
11. **Hoffman’s will not buy the meat.** You must find a buyer for the pig. Cutting instructions should be called into Hoffman’s, 419-864-3994, by Wednesday, following the fair.
